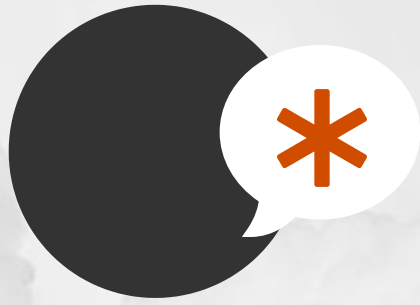


Feedback from participants
